CITY OF MADISON OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

MINUTES OF THE MADISON CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MARCH 26, 2018

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the Madison City Council was called to order by Mayor Thole on Monday, March 26, 2018, at 5:05 p.m. in Council Chambers at City Hall. Councilmembers present were: Tim Volk, Mayor Greg Thole, Maynard Meyer, and Paul Zahrbock. Also present were: City Manager Val Halvorson and City Clerk Kathleen Weber. Absent: Councilmember Adam Conroy and City Attorney Rick Stulz.

AGENDA

Upon motion by Meyer, seconded by Volk and carried, the Agenda was approved as presented. All agenda items are hereby placed on the table for discussion.

MINUTES

Upon motion by Zahrbock, seconded by Volk and carried, March 12, 2018, meeting minutes were approved as presented.

<u>PUBLIC PETITIONS, REQUESTS, HEARINGS AND COMMUNICATIONS</u>

None.

CONSENT AGENDA

Upon motion by Meyer, seconded by Zahrbock and carried, Consent Agenda was approved as presented.

CITY COUNCIL CHECKLIST

Council reviewed the City Council Checklist.

Prairie Arts Center: Council was informed that the Prairie Arts Center restroom/flooring restoration project has been started. This project will be funded in part by a \$10,000 grant from the Southwest MN Arts Council. In regard to creation of an agreement between the City of Madison and the Lac qui Parle Players for building use, the issue of insurance coverage as it relates to light and sound equipment was discussed. This matter will be discussed and included in the final draft of the proposed agreement upon review and recommendation of City Attorney Stulz.

Public Restrooms: City Manager Halvorson noted that a second meeting was held with LqP Ag Society members last week and another meeting is scheduled for next week. Mayor Thole indicated that the LqP Ag Society is receptive to a joint public restroom project, and the group is narrowing down estimates. Helpful information has been obtained from Swift County on their restroom project.

CITY ENGINEER UPDATE

No project update at this time.

GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE PROBATIONARY PERIOD

Upon motion by Zahrbock, seconded by Meyer and carried, Council approved a zero-day probationary period for new employees eligible for group health insurance through the City of Madison. All new group members' insurance would become effective the 1st day of the month following hire date.

WEBSITE UPDATE

City Manager Halvorson informed Council that she and Cheri Tuckett have been working with Vivid Image, Inc. on designing the new City/Chamber website and noted that they have been very good to work with. Council approved including their phone numbers on the website. Halvorson noted that the City and Chamber will be responsible for updating the website once the design is complete and that Cheri Tuckett has good "vision" in assisting with the website design.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS

Councilmember Zahrbock noted that a resident expressed concern to him about the city not enforcing the snow removal parking ordinance. City Manager Halvorson noted that the last two snowfalls happened on the weekend and by the time letters would have been sent out, the snow would be melted.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Madison Arts Council: City Manager Halvorson reminded Council that the Madison Arts Council forum has been rescheduled to Monday, April 2nd, due to bad weather.

Job Postings: Council was informed that the City is advertising for its Heavy Equipment Operator position, swimming pool positions, and street/parks summer positions.

MN Historical Society Legacy Grant: City Manager Halvorson noted that progress continues to be made in the next phase of the City's proposed City Hall renovation project. Planning work thus far has been funded by grant dollars.

Electronic Records: City Manager Halvorson informed Council that she and business office staff have reviewed three vendors offering electronic record keeping and workflow software. An in-person demonstration of Laser Fische software at Lac qui Parle County Courthouse and Marshall City Hall provided very good insight. She noted that this item was included in the 2018 budget and would include the purchase of 2 scanners and software.

Competitive Bidding: City Manager Halvorson informed Council that there is a house file in the legislature now that proposes the increase of competitive bidding threshold from \$100,000 to \$175,000.

Broadband Exploration: Councilmember Meyer and City Manager Halvorson updated Council on the broadband exploration project. It was noted that neither could attend a rescheduled meeting but Pam Ellison; Antonio Franklin, Jr.; and Kevin Beyer did meet with legislative representatives to discuss funding possibilities for broadband upgrade. Due to excessive cost of a self-funded project, it had been "tabled" by the City.

DISBURSEMENTS

Upon motion by Volk, seconded by Zahrbock and carried, Council approved disbursements for bills submitted between March 13th and March 26th, 2018. These disbursements include United Prairie Check Nos. 56130-56189.

Quarter Two materials for the Value of Public Power campaign are now available on the members-only section of the MRES website. In addition, we plan to develop a 30-second video, which focuses on storm preparation and electrical safety.

Iowa

The countdown is on! Last week marked the 11th week of the Iowa Legislative session, which meant that the Senate only considered House bills and unfinished business, while the House only considered Senate bills and unfinished business. With less than a month to go before the state ceases to pay for legislators per diem expenses, the pace will quicken even though there are several prominent issues remaining, for instance, the Tax Reform and the Governor's budget bill.

The Omnibus Energy Bill, <u>SF2311</u>, continues to languish on the House floor and continues to draw additional scrutiny. Unfortunately, the energy efficiency 'right-sizing' along with several other issues within the bill have become so muddled that they threaten to sink the entire Omnibus bill. Energy efficiency programs are being viewed as either a hidden tax secretly leveled on Iowa taxpayers or as an investment in Iowan's future. While the points of view and the rationale behind offering energy efficiency programs can vary widely, we will continue to emphasize local

control so that our customer-owners be allowed to choose the services that they want from their utilities, including energy efficiency.

In addition to energy efficiency, the Right of First Refusal (ROFR) issue is getting muddled as well. This section of the Omnibus Bill attempts to limit the right to invest in new transmission lines to current transmission owners. Representative Guy Vander Linden (R-Oskaloosa) has introduced an amendment <u>H-8306</u> which would completely strike the ROFR section from the bill. Until the bill is actually heard and passed on the House floor, look for new proposed amendments to pop up.

Meanwhile, Senator Randy Feenstra (R-Hull) had authored an additional utility bill, <u>SSB 3078</u>, which would strike all state statute references to energy efficiency or energy efficiency programs. Initially it was thought that this bill would remain shelved in favor of the Omnibus Energy bill, but now may become a fall back option to try to pass a smaller less controversial bill. On March 19, the bill was heard in subcommittee and was recommended for passage the next day. This bill is likely to be amended to only limit energy efficiency spending at 2 percent of rate revenue rather than a total elimination of energy efficiency programs. As a Ways and Means bill, it is not subject to committee deadlines. Despite the limited time left in session, it is still likely that some sort of utility reform bill will pass.

Meanwhile, <u>HF 2307</u>, which would expand the role of the Iowa Utilities Board in the possible sale of a water or wastewater utility, has been signed by the Governor. Also, <u>SF 2235</u>, which would make it a felony to damage critical energy infrastructure, has passed the Senate (33-16), and is pending in the House. Finally, <u>HF 2458</u>, Governor Reynold's Future Ready Iowa Act has passed the House (98-0) and the Senate (47-0) and is now destined for the Governor's desk. The goal of this bill is for over 70% of Iowans to have access to additional educational opportunities beyond high school by the year 2025.

Minnesota

March 22 marked the day that committees must act favorably on policy bills in committees in their house of origin; March 29 marks the day that committees must act favorably on companion bills. So last week was very busy and this coming week will be very, very busy!

Third Party Sales Behind the Meter:

HF 3685/SF 2919: This bill attempts to allow third parties to sell electricity directly to customers by modifying the definition of "public utility" in chapter 216B to exclude third parties who furnish electricity from wind or solar on customer's property. The Senate bill was not heard last week, but the House bill, HF 3685 will be heard in House Job Growth and Energy Affordability Policy and Finance committee on Wednesday, March 28. I will be sending out a more complete Action Alert to our Minnesota municipal utilities separate from this newsletter either later today or tomorrow detailing the talking points on this bill. This bill is very concerning to all utilities, in particular the municipal electric utilities. By defining such entities

as not being "public utilities", it allows anyone to provide power while not being subject to any authority—not safety rules, not NERC rules, and not cyber security rules. Most importantly, it provides no protection for the customers. When a problem occurs, the customer has only whatever recourse—if any—that is in the contract signed with the third party provider. There is no recourse at the Public Utilities Commission, no recourse with your local utility, and no recourse from your local city council or commission.

There are other bills that MRES is monitoring or heavily involved in:

- <u>HF 3497/SF 3166</u>: A bill proposing to cap wireless equipment application fees at \$3,000 for wireless facilities to be attached to water towers, buildings or "other structures designed for other purposes." The utilities are opposing this bill as it undercuts the work that was done last year on the small cell wireless bill; and it requires utility customers to subsidize the work that must be done to review the application for safety, structural integrity, and make-ready work. It has not been set for hearing in committee at this writing.
- HF 3688/SF 3245: This bill proposes to reinstate the Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) program for residential customers. This version of the bill is supported by the realtors, the banks, low-income advocates, and the Center for Energy and the Environment. This has passed at least one committee in both the House and Senate now. In the House, it has passed Commerce and Regulatory Reform and is now pending in Government Operations and Elections Policy Committee. In the Senate, it has passed Energy and Utilities Finance and Policy, Commerce and Consumer Protection Finance and Policy, and Judiciary and Public Safety Finance and Policy. It is pending in Senate Taxes committee. While there is still some contractor opposition to this bill because it makes the clean energy lien secondary to the mortgage, it is still moving through committees at a steady pace.
- <u>HF 3792/SF 3400</u>: Requiring that by 2020, all wind generation turbines install aircraft detection lighting systems. It was scheduled to be heard in Senate Energy and Utilities Finance and Policy committee, but was withdrawn from the hearing schedule. It has not been set for any further hearings at this writing.
- HF 4046/SF 3266: A bill that impacts the IOUs only, but all utilities are watching it. The bill originally would have required the IOU Integrated Resource Plans (IRP) to include an assessment of energy storage system feasibility and required the Public Utilities Commission to set mandatory deployment targets of storage based on the IRP assessment. The bill has been amended to take out the mandatory targets. It passed out of Senate Energy and Utilities Committee last week and is now in the Senate Finance Committee. The House bill has not been set for committee hearing at this writing.
- HF 3473/SF 3110: Allowing high-voltage transmission projects of greater than 200 kV to forego the Certificate of Need process when all affected landowners have already granted secured easements on the proposed route. It has not been set for any committee hearings at this writing.
- <u>HF 3993/SF 3558</u>: This bill would extend the assessments on utilities (the assessments were due to sunset) to pay for the state's CIP related software and would create a stakeholder group to oversee the software spending. MRES is concerned with this as its members generally do not use the software and the assessment seems to be on-going. It

has passed out of the Senate Energy and Utilities committee and is pending on the Senate floor. It has not been set for hearing in the House.

There are also some non-energy bills that MRES is watching carefully:

- HF 3034/SF 2491: To make public entity settlement agreements public and to file a report of public entity settlement agreements with the Legislature. MRES is concerned that this opens the door to allowing the public to gain information in sexual harassment or misconduct cases in which the perpetrator may have had a finding in his/her favor, but a severance settlement was reached with one of the two parties for workplace harmony considerations. The Senate version of the bill has passed out of State Government Finance and Policy and Elections committee and is now pending in Judiciary and Public Safety Finance and Policy. It has not been heard in the House and it appears it may have stalled.
- <u>HF 3698/SF 3602</u>: A bill to allow public-private partnerships for infrastructure projects. MRES is concerned as this bill could open the door for mandating that public entities allow more private ownership of what are already publically-owned assets. This bill appears to have stalled out and is not set for a committee hearing.

North Dakota

On March 19, the North Dakota Supreme Court heard arguments in a lawsuit filed by the Republican-led General Assembly against GOP Governor Doug Burgum. The crux of the lawsuit is whether the governor violated his line-item veto power last session. The lawsuit filed in December disputes five partial vetoes Burgum made to four bills in May 2017 that deleted words or phrases. Legislators say the selective edits resulted in changing the intent of the bills.

There have been some discussions locally with law enforcement about protest activity occurring with Keystone XL pipeline project. After the protests around the Dakota Access project last year, it is expected that law enforcement will undergo certain training in advance of any protest activity to help prepare. Specifically, the local Montana area law enforcement recently went through Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) training as a preemptive move. The training was focused on how to effectively respond to and to work with citizens that may gather and protest against the Keystone XL pipeline project. The local law enforcement in Montana believe there will be protests, but hope that the protest activity stays civil. Law enforcement in North Dakota has also been alerted that they may be called into service to assist Montana law enforcement to deal with protests.

The 2018 Williston Basin Petroleum Conference (WBPC) will be held May 22 to 24, in Bismarck. Seven executives and J.C. Watts (former Republican Congressman from Oklahoma) are among the 40 speakers who will present their insight and expertise at the conference. The WBPC remains one of the largest oil and gas conferences in the nation, attracting more than 2,500 people each year. The conference is known for bringing in high-caliber speakers.

South Dakota

Session is almost over. The final step is "Veto Day" which is Monday, March 26. The legislature will reconvene in Pierre for one reason only—to consider overriding any gubernatorial vetoes. There is only one bill that MRES was monitoring that was vetoed by the Governor. That bill was HB 1268 which revised the dates that legislators may begin pre-filing bills for the up-coming legislative session. Under the proposed bill, pre-filed bills may be filed at any time beginning the day after the completion of the official canvass of the State Canvassing Board during an election year, or at any time beginning July 1 in an odd-numbered, non-election year. We will report the outcome of this bill's potential veto challenge next Monday.

Open Meetings/Public Records/Cyber Security

MRES was involved with several open meetings and public records bills. Two that were monitored, but did not pass were <u>HB 1141</u> and <u>HB 1142</u>. The bills would have allowed small municipals or school districts to publish notices and minutes on-line (<u>HB 1141</u>) and would have allowed municipal and school districts underserved by newspapers to publish some notices online (<u>HB 1142</u>). While neither passed, it did bring up a debate that is occurring more and more in states—given the fact that the general public relies increasingly on electronic media for information, should there still be required newspaper publications.

Another bill MRES was involved in was <u>SB 62</u>, which requires all entities (political subdivisions, hospitals, banks, etc.) to notify persons whose personal or protected information may have been put at risk of a breach, passed both houses. The bill requires that residents be notified within 60 days of a breach's discovery <u>unless</u> the company and the Attorney General determine it likely would not harm the affected people. The bill would also require companies to inform the attorney general if a breach affected more than 250 residents. It was signed by the Governor on March 21.

Finally, <u>HB 1172</u> passed both houses with very little opposition. It would require that there be time reserved at all public meetings to take public comment. The amount of time reserved for comment is up to the Chair of the public entity. It was signed by the Governor on March 22.

Wind Energy Bills

There were a multitude of wind energy bills introduced this year, including: <u>HB 1022</u> (allowing the Public Utilities Commission 6 months instead of one year to approve a wind siting permit), <u>HB 1164</u> (requiring changes in notice to affected persons and clarifying when persons may intervene in a permit case), <u>HB 1234</u> (requiring state decommissioning rules for wind), <u>HB 1235</u> (requiring local government/county rules for decommissioning wind), and <u>SB 127</u> (allowing for the reconfiguration of wind towers that varies from the original permit). All of these bills were either deferred to the non-existent 41st Legislative Day or failed in committee.

Property Assessed Clean Energy

The Property Assessed Clean Energy bill (PACE) was introduced as <u>HB 1301</u> and was universally opposed by all of the utilities. It was deferred to the non-existent 41st Legislative Day on 10 to 3 vote by the House Commerce and Energy Committee.

Ballot Measure Approved

<u>SJR 1</u> passed both houses and places a measure on the November ballot. Voters will decide whether to amend the state Constitution to require that at least 55 percent of the votes cast be in favor of a constitutional measure before it is considered passed. This is a change to current law which only requires a simple majority to pass a state Constitutional measures.

Wyoming

The 2018 Wyoming Legislative budget session is over and now begins a 9-month discussion of the results. Budget deficits will continue as demand for monetary resources also grows. Since this is an election year, a new Governor and fresh legislators will return to face similar challenges next year. A couple of the issues that we were following this year will most certainly return. SF 74, which would have strengthened the crimes against critical infrastructure had passed both the Senate and the House only to be vetoed by the Governor. This is becoming a familiar issue in many states; it will be revised in the interim to smooth the way for passage during the 2019 Wyoming legislative session. Also, severance taxes on natural resources are bound to be discussed in an environment where the state is running close to a \$1 billion deficit. MRES will continue to monitor the interim committees throughout the summer.

Federal

Senators, Representatives Voice Opposition to Budget Proposals to Privatize WAPA Transmission and Move to Market Rates. In two letters, members of the House and Senate voiced their strong opposition to the Administration's proposals to sell the transmission assets of WAPA and the other PMAs and to sell PMA power at market-based rates. Noting the long, bipartisan opposition to similar proposals, 23 Senators—including Senators Ernst, Heitkamp, Hoeven, Klobuchar, Rounds, and Smith—wrote Office of Management and Budget Director Mulvaney objecting to these proposals that threaten reliable and affordable electric service. And in the House, noting that the budget proposal creates unnecessary financial risks to the federal entities and brings uncertainty to consumers, 59 Representatives wrote the leaders of the House Budget Committee urging rejection of the PMA initiatives which "could lead to widespread decreases in service, or loss of access to an economic and stable power supply". MRES delegation members Representatives Cramer, Loebsack, King, Peterson, and Walz signed the letter.

Iowa

We are now into the 13th week of the Iowa legislative session. Lawmakers are trying to finish their work by April 17, which is the 100th day of session and under the state Constitution, a daily per diem will no longer be paid. In short, legislators may continue to meet after April 17, but they will not be paid.

The State Budget Bill, <u>SF 2117</u>, has been signed and will reduce state spending by about \$35 million. The House Tax Reform bill is still being discussed in committee and has not reached the House floor for debate. This bill is projected to save Iowa taxpayers up to \$1.7 billion over the next six years.

The Omnibus Energy Bill, <u>SF 2311</u>, continues to wait for consideration before the House and is expected to draw additional criticism and amendments. House leadership has been reluctant to move the bill forward and would prefer a less controversial approach. As a result, another bill is being considered to take the place of SF 2311. Earlier in this session, Senator Randy Feenstra (R-Hull) authored <u>SSB 3078</u>, which would strike all state statutory references to energy efficiency and energy efficiency programs. This could become the fall back option to try to pass a smaller, less controversial bill. Senator Feenstra is amenable to amending his bill to include compromise language on energy efficiency and other non-controversial issues from the Omnibus Energy Bill.

The current compromise being discussed would cap Investor Owned Utility (IOU) energy efficiency programs at two percent spending, demand response programs at two percent, and natural gas programs at 1.5 percent. The IOUs are agreeable to that option. Additionally, municipal electric utilities would no longer have energy efficiency reporting requirements to the Iowa Utilities Board; but would still have federal reporting responsibilities. Finally, the amended bill would encompass changes to Iowa Chapter 28F law to allow municipals to finance for natural gas expansion. House leadership is still considering potential amendments to SSB 3078 in order to decide whether to go forward on the original Omnibus Energy Bill or to amend SSB 3078 as a smaller bill. It is too early to tell which version will move forward.

Meanwhile, <u>SF 2235</u>, which creates the crime of intentionally damaging critical infrastructure, has passed both the Senate and the House and is awaiting the Governor's signature. <u>SF 2155</u>, which would allow communities additional time to invest and spend state funding, passed both the Senate and the House unanimously and is pending the Governor's approval.

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Minnesota

Thursday, March 29, marked the day that committees had to act favorably on companion policy bills or the bills would be considered "dead." So last week was very, very busy! However, in both the Senate and the House, committees that cover both policy and finance bills have declared that all bills before their committees are not subject to policy deadlines, but are instead subject to the finance bill deadline of April 20. The legislature is on break this week and committee work will be taken up as soon as they return on April 9. We will see on April 9, as to how many policy bills will be heard in committees even though deadlines have technically passed.

Additionally, the rumor is spreading quickly that there will be not one, but two Omnibus-Omnibus bills. Specifically, there will be a very large Omnibus Budget Bill containing a large amount of the financing and appropriation bills in one bill. Then, there will likely be a Supplementary Omnibus Budget Bill, which would contain a large variety of finance and policy bills all cobbled into a large bill. This will likely make conference committees and floor debates very contentious and very long in the waning days of session in May.

Third Party Sales Behind the Meter:

HF 3685/SF 2919: As reported previously, this bill attempts to allow third parties to sell electricity directly to customers by modifying the definition of "public utility" in chapter 216B to exclude third parties who furnish electricity from wind or solar on customer's property. The Senate bill was not heard, but the House bill, HF 3685 was heard in House Job Growth and Energy Affordability Policy and Finance committee on Wednesday, March 28. The only testimony in favor of the bill came from the bill author and the Retailers Association. Opposing testimony came from Wright-Hennepin Cooperative, Minnesota Power, Missouri River Energy Services, Xcel Energy, the Minnesota Center for Energy and Environment, and Minnesota Legal Aid. Other utilities were also lined up to testify, but it became clear that the committee and the committee chair were done listening to testimony. No vote was taken and the committee chair

Pat Garofalo (R-Farmington) laid over the bill, announcing that he would NOT be including it in the Omnibus bill. However, there is clearly more appetite at the Capitol for discussion of deregulation and bringing more players and innovation to the table. This will be an on-going issue at the Capitol over the next few years. It should also be noted that some legislators will be going to Nevada the week after Easter for fact-finding on deregulation. The voters of Nevada have voted in favor of a state Constitutional amendment to bring deregulation to the state.

There are other bills that MRES is monitoring or heavily involved in:

- HF 3497/SF 3166: A bill proposing to cap wireless equipment application fees at \$3,000 for wireless facilities to be attached to water towers, buildings or "other structures designed for other purposes." The utilities opposed this bill as it requires utility customers to subsidize the work that must be done to review the application for safety, structural integrity, and make-ready work. It was not heard before policy deadlines, but we will continue to guard against its appearance throughout the remainder of session.
- HF 3688/SF 3245: This bill proposes to reinstate the Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) program for residential customers. This version of the bill is supported by the realtors, the banks, low-income advocates, and the Center for Energy and the Environment. While there is still some contractor opposition to this bill because it makes the clean energy lien secondary to the mortgage, it is still moving through committees at a steady pace. It is unclear whether this will continue to move ahead on its own or if it would end up in an Omnibus bill. Advocates for the bill would rather see it move ahead on its own rather than risk getting lost or traded in a large omnibus bill.
- HF 4046/SF 3266: A bill that impacts the IOUs only, but all utilities are watching it. The bill originally would have required the IOU Integrated Resource Plans (IRP) to include an assessment of energy storage system feasibility and required the Public Utilities Commission to set mandatory deployment targets of storage based on the IRP assessment. The bill has been amended to take out the mandatory targets. It passed out of Senate Energy and Utilities Committee last week and is now in the Senate Finance Committee. It has not been heard in the House, but because the GOP wants to do "something" on storage, it may end up in an Omnibus bill.
- <u>HF 3473/SF 3110</u>: Allowing high-voltage transmission projects of greater than 200 kV to forego the Certificate of Need process when all affected landowners have already granted secured easements on the proposed route. It has not been set for any committee hearings, but it could end up in an Omnibus bill.
- HF 3993/SF 3558: This bill would extend the assessments on utilities (the assessments were due to sunset) to pay for the state's Conservation Improvement Program related software and would create a stakeholder group to oversee the software spending. MRES is concerned with this as its members generally do not use the software and the assessment seems to be on-going. It has passed out of the Senate Energy and Utilities committee and is currently pending in Senate Finance. It has not been heard in the House; but it could end up in an Omnibus bill or still be heard after the legislative break.

There are also some non-energy bills that MRES is watching carefully:

• <u>HF 3034/SF 2491</u>: To make public entity settlement agreements public and to file a report of public entity settlement agreements with the Legislature. MRES is concerned that this would require MRES to make a filing in Minnesota when entering a settlement

agreement involving employee misconduct that occurred in another state where MRES employees work (e.g., Iowa). MRES testified against the bill in Senate Judiciary and Public Safety Finance and Policy last week. There does seem to be some appetite in amending the bill to carve out MRES. We will work with the Senate author on options. It has not been heard in the House, so it is still unknown if the bill will move forward.

North Dakota

The Natural Resources interim committee met on March 29. The committee covered two topics that MRES is monitoring: wind energy reclamation and interaction with political subdivisions and landowners during the siting process. The state Game and Fish department gave a presentation that covered both the department's involvement in local landowners as well as its concerns for impacts that wind development may have on wildlife habitats, including noise, shadow flickers, and bird fatalities. The department noted that in some areas of wind development, they are seeing bird habitats decreasing. The department outlined its efforts to assess impacts and to work with developers on offsetting those wildlife impacts. Representatives of landowners also spoke. They pointed out their concerns not only with reclamation of wind projects, but setbacks and appropriate compensation. The committee is tentatively set to meet next on June 6.

South Dakota

"Veto Day" was last Monday, March 26. The legislature reconvened in Pierre to consider overriding gubernatorial vetoes. There was only one bill that MRES was monitoring that was vetoed by the Governor. That bill was HB 1268 which revised the dates that legislators may begin pre-filing bills for the up-coming legislative session. Under the proposed bill, pre-filed bills may be filed at any time beginning the day after the completion of the official canvass of the State Canvassing Board during an election year, or at any time beginning July 1, in an odd-numbered, non-election year. The veto override failed on a vote of 39 to 24.


It was an interesting year. Highlights of the 2018 Legislative Session include:

- 1. Nonmeandered water legislation beneficial to sportsmen failed. The legislation would have prohibited "pay to fish" activities and provided that water marked as closed to one person/entity was closed to all public and private fishing.
- 2. Constitutional gun carry and modified constitutional gun carry bills failed to clear both chambers.
- 3. Alcohol laws were modified to assist craft breweries increasing the amount of beer they could produce and distribute.
- 4. Constitutional language on ballot amendments to Marsy's Law were agreed upon by proponents and opponents for the placement on the next election ballot.
- 5. The precision agricultural building was authorized to be funded and built at South Dakota State University even though it was not authorized in the Governor's budget.
- 6. House Representative David Johnson (R-Rapid City) was accused by Representative Lynne DiSanto (R-Box Elder) and by other witnesses of assaulting her verbally. A special

- disciplinary committee was formed to deal with the issue and later disbanded. House leadership publicly insinuated that DiSanto was being less than truthful and called for an apology on her part, which was not received.
- 7. Voters will decide next November whether to amend the state Constitution to require that at least 55 percent of the votes cast be in favor of a constitutional measure before it is considered passed.

SENATE APPROVES PENSION BILL, EMPLOYEE CONTRACTS

For three years, legislators worked with all interested parties to craft a pension agreement that ensures stability across all the state's pension funds. On Monday, that agreement (the 2018 Omnibus Pension Bill) was brought before the full Senate and passed unanimously.

It was vital to craft a fiscally responsible plan that included shared sacrifice and shared benefit between the retirees, the actives, the employers, and the state. This bill is the most significant pension reform in the state's history, and ensures that a state pension plan will be on sound financial footing for generations to come.

The Senate also approved the labor contracts for the state's employees (Senate File 3154). The House approved the contracts on Tuesday, and the governor signed the bill.



DITCH MOWING PERMITS BILL ADVANCES

Senator Dahms is chief author of a bill (Senate File 3569) requiring a one year moratorium on enforcement of ditch mowing permits. If passed, the Department of Transportation would not be able to enforce its permit rule to mow or bale hay in the right-of-way of a trunk highway until April 30, 2019. The bill was heard in the Senate Transportation Finance and Policy Committee, passed, and now awaits consideration by the full Senate.



HIGHWAY 14/15 NEW ULM GATEWAY CONSTRUCTION STARTS APRIL 3 WITH DETOUR

Weather permitting, construction will begin on the Highway 14/15 New Ulm Gateway project on Tuesday, April 3, and motorists will be detoured around the project.

Highway 14/15 from Broadway Street to Nicollet County Road 21, including the bridge over Front Street, will be closed and motorists will be detoured from Highway 14 to Nicollet County Road 37/20th Street South to Broadway Street until October.

Weekly construction meetings for the public will be held on Mondays at 2:30 p.m. at 1800 South Valley Street, New Ulm. For detour and construction staging maps, and to sign up for project email updates, visit www.mndot.gov/newulm.

In 2019 MnDOT will replace the Minnesota River Bridge and build a new interchange at the intersection of Highway 14/15/County Road 21. Mathiowetz Construction of Sleepy Eye was awarded the contract with a bid of \$31,452,543.

The Highway 14/15 New Ulm Gateway project addresses intersection safety, aging bridges, poor pavement conditions and occasional road flooding around New Ulm. Construction began in 2017 with the majority of the work and detours taking place in 2018 and 2019. For updated road condition information, call 511 or visit www.511mn.org
