CITY OF MADISON OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

MINUTES OF THE MADISON CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING AUGUST 12, 2019

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the Madison City Council was called to order by Mayor Thole on Monday, August 12, 2019, at 5:04 p.m. in Council Chambers at City Hall. Councilmembers present were: Tim Volk, Mayor Greg Thole, Maynard Meyer, Paul Zahrbock, and Adam Conroy. Also present were: City Manager Val Halvorson, City Attorney Rick Stulz, and City Clerk Kathleen Weber.

AGENDA

Upon motion by Zahrbock, seconded by Volk and carried, the Agenda was approved as presented. All agenda items are hereby placed on the table for discussion.

MINUTES

Upon motion by Meyer, seconded by Conroy and carried, July 22, 2019, meeting minutes were approved as presented.

PUBLIC PETITIONS, REQUESTS, HEARINGS AND COMMUNICATIONS

None.

CONSENT AGENDA

Upon motion by Zahrbock, seconded by Volk and carried, the Consent Agenda was approved as presented. Included on the Consent Agenda was an Application for Excluded Bingo from the Madison Fire Department and the Bellingham Fire Department, along with a letter to the MN Gambling Control Board from St. Michael's Church to add bingo to their Charitable Gambling License approved at the last meeting. Also included was the Madison Fire Relief Association Schedule for Lump-Sum Pension Plans (SC-19) for 2019 which indicates no municipal contribution required in 2020. Councilmember Conroy asked how pool attendance for July compared to last year. City Manager Halvorson did not have that information available right now.

CITY COUNCIL CHECKLIST

City Manager Halvorson noted that no changes were made to the City Council checklist. Regarding the Madison Swimming Pool, staff will be able to operate it through August 24th and close it down August 25th. Council was happy with that closing date as school starts on August 26th.

CITY ENGINEER UPDATE

City Manager Halvorson noted that City Engineer Phil DeSchepper had nothing to report for this meeting, and that there were no outstanding invoices to approve for payment.

HYDROGEOLOGIC ASSESSMENT DRINKING WATER SOURCE AND WELLS

Council acknowledged receipt of a Hydrogeologic Assessment of the Drinking Water Source and Wells for the City of Madison. City Manager Halvorson noted that this assessment has been in the works since 2016 and its purpose is to identify the City's wellhead protection area, its emergency response area, and its drinking water supply management area. Vulnerabilities of the well and drinking water supply management area are also included in this report. Acceptance of this report by the City Council is the first step. Secondly, the MN Department of Health would hold a public hearing based on this assessment, and Requests for Proposals would follow the public hearing. After further discussion, upon motion by

Zahrbock, seconded by Conroy and carried, Council formally requests the MN Department of Health to review and approve Part I of the assessment as presented.

CITY HALL ROOFING PROJECT

Upon motion by Volk, seconded by Meyer and carried, Council authorized advertising for bids for the Madison City Hall roofing project with a project completion date of October 31, 2019. Bids will be due September 12, 2019. Alternate bids will also be accepted for work to be completed spring 2020. It was noted that the roofing project bid would be for labor only, as the city will purchase materials directly. City Attorney Stulz noted that the Bid Bond and/or Performance Bond are often waived on smaller projects which will be bid by local contractors.

CITY HALL EXTERIOR REHABILIATION PROJECT (LEGACY GRANT)

Upon motion by Meyer, seconded by Zahrbock and carried, Council authorized advertising for bids for the Madison City Hall Exterior Rehabilitation Project, which is contingent on the award of a Legacy Grant through the MN Historical Society. City Manager Halvorson noted that the city can "pick and choose" which pieces of the project will be completed; and given the specialty work associated with this project, advertising will be on a larger scope. Bid deadline is September 12, 2019, with a project completion date of December 15, 2020.

CLOSING 2009 GO TEMP IMPROVEMENT DEBT SERVICE FUND

Upon motion by Volk, seconded by Zahrbock and carried, **RESOLUTION 19-32** titled "Resolution for Permanent Transfer and Closing Fund No. 308 – 2009 GO Temporary Improvement Debt Service Fund Effective August 12, 2019" was adopted. This resolution would provide for the permanent transfer of \$2,867.00 from Fund No. 308 to Fund No. 350 Infrastructure Debt Service Fund as recommended by city auditor. A complete copy of Resolution 19-32 is contained in City Clerk's Book #9.

CITY HALL KEY CONTROL

Upon motion by Meyer, seconded by Conroy and carried, **RESOLUTION 19-33** titled "Resolution for City Key Control" was adopted. This resolution would provide for a city hall key to be issued to the three public works supervisors as well as the Water Plant Operator and Wastewater Treatment Plant Operator. These individuals unlock City Hall on weekends when reserved. A complete copy of Resolution 19-33 is contained in City Clerk's Book #9.

SOUTHWEST MN INITIATIVE FOUNDATION

Upon motion by Conroy, seconded by Zahrbock and carried, Council approved a request from the Southwest MN Initiative Foundation for a 2020 appropriation of \$1,375.00. City Manager Halvorson noted that this appropriation will be included in the economic development budget.

PRELIMINARY LEVY PUBLIC HEARING

Upon motion by Zahrbock, seconded by Volk and carried, Council set a public hearing for Monday, September 23, 2019, at 6:00 p.m. for the purpose of establishing the city's preliminary tax levy collectible 2020.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

City Manager Halvorson reminded Council of a dinner and discussion gathering that Missouri River Energy Services will be sponsoring in Alexandria on September 5th for area members and city policymakers. RSVP's are due August 22nd.

Electrical and water upgrades have been made at the city campground and concrete has been poured for the camper dump station.

Madison City Council August 12, 2019 Regular Meeting

Repair of the asphalt at the LqP County Fairgrounds was completed on Saturday. Some damage occurred during snow hauling this winter.

MRES representatives were here to meeting with staff in regarding to Advanced Metering Infrastructure, customer portals, and potential billing options.

Chamber members were invited to tour the Sunset Villa apartments on 9th Avenue. The new owners are making improvements and will be marketing them in the near future.

West Central Roofing has removed debris and repaired the tower roof. While there, a leak in the valley was discovered. West Central Roofing will provide an estimate for that repair.

The City was well represented at the Madison Cup tourney held at the Madison Country Club with a team consisting of Dennis Vonderharr, Greg Thole, City Engineer Phil DeSchepper, and Val Halvorson.

The city's Code Enforcement Officer, David Redepenning, is monitoring mowing and public nuisance violations and is seeing positive movement in this regard.

City Manager Halvorson presented Council with a memo in regard to staffing. She noted that the Public Works Coordinator position will not be filled at this time, and she will work with staff supervisors and report to the General Government Committee in 6 months.



Welcome to Laramie River Station



Laramie River Station, located 6 miles northeast of Wheatland, WY, makes electricity from subbituminous coal and consistently ranks as one of the lowest-cost producers of electricity when compared to all other power plants in the United States.

It is one of the largest consumer-owned, regional joint power supply programs in the United States. Laramie River is owned by the Missouri Basin Power Project (MBPP), a group of six consumer-owned electric utilities, and operated by Basin Electric Power Cooperative. Together, the MBPP participants serve more than two million people in the Missouri River Basin region.

Laramie River is unique because it delivers electricity to two separate electrical grids. Unit 1 is connected to the Eastern Interconnection, while Unit 2 and Unit 3 are connected to the Western Interconnection. These grids, which divide the United States into two sections, were developed independently and must be served separately.

Laramie River Station at a glance:

- Total output: 1,710 megawatts (MW).
 1 MW = power for about 800 homes.
- Consists of three units, each rated at 570 MW.
- Began commercial operation in 1980 (Unit 1), 1981 (Unit 2) and 1982 (Unit 3).
- Constructed for \$1.6 billion.
- Transmission facilities include both 230-kilovolt (kV) and 345-kV lines and substations in Wyoming, Nebraska and Colorado.
- Owned by Missouri Basin Power Project, which consists of Basin Electric Power Cooperative, Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Western Minnesota Municipal Power Agency, Lincoln Electric System, Heartland Consumers Power District and Wyoming Municipal Power Agency.

Missouri Basin Power Project Participants

Basin Electric Power Cooperative, Bismarck, ND, generates and transmits electricity to 138 member rural electric systems in nine states. Basin Electric is the operating agent for Laramie River.

Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Denver, CO, is a wholesale power supplier to 44 rural electric cooperatives in Nebraska, Colorado, New Mexico and Wyoming.

The Western Minnesota Municipal Power Agency, Ortonville, MN, is a group of municipally-owned electric systems in Minnesota that are represented in the Project by Missouri River Energy Services, Sioux Falls, SD.

The Lincoln Electric System, Lincoln, NE, is the largest municipally-owned electric system in the Missouri Basin.

The Heartland Consumers Power District, Madison, SD, is a public power district serving South Dakota agencies and municipal electric systems in South Dakota, Iowa and western Minnesota.

The Wyoming Municipal Power Agency, Lusk, WY, is a group of eight municipally-owned electric systems organized to develop additional power supply sources to supplement their federal power allocations.



Production of electricity involves heating water to make steam. The steam spins a turbine that drives a generator to produce electricity. This cycle is the same whether a plant gets heat from nuclear energy or burns gas, oil or coal. Beyond the similarity in this cycle, power plants can be very different from one another.

The largest piece of equipment in each Laramie River unit is its boiler, measuring 225 feet tall. At maximum production each of its three boilers consumes 360 tons of pulverized coal per hour to produce superheated steam at a temperature of 1,005 degrees Fahrenheit and at a pressure of 2,400 pounds per square inch.

Steam is used to drive a multi-stage (high-, intermediate- and low-pressure) turbine connected to a generator. The turbine develops more than 750,000 horsepower to spin the generator at 3,600 revolutions per minute. The speed of the turbine generator is constant, regardless of generator output.

The electricity produced at Laramie River is distributed to MBPP participants via 700 miles of high-voltage transmission lines connecting the plant to substations in Wyoming, Nebraska and Colorado.

Coal supply and availability

Laramie River's fuel source is subbituminous coal, a low-cost fuel source that helps make Laramie River a low-cost energy producer. The coal is supplied by Western Fuels Association, a cooperative fuel supplier for consumer-owned utilities, and delivered by rail from surface mines near Gillette, WY.





Located 11 miles east of Laramie River, the 104,000 acre-foot Grayrocks Reservoir is the principal water source for the plant. Along with other groundwater sources, it provides up to 23,250 acre-feet of water annually to Laramie River for steam production and cooling. The reservoir, which is about eight miles long, includes recreational facilities and a visitor overlook. Several species of game fish are stocked in the reservoir.

Environmental compliance

Laramie River is an environmentally compliant power plant with many recent environmental and technological upgrades to meet the changing regulatory requirements to protect land, air and water. It features state-of-the art controls to meet Regional Haze air quality standards, and other controls that were recently added to reduce mercury emissions.

At the time of construction, the environmental controls installed at Laramie River were the best available control technology. Since then, the station has continued to upgrade environmental controls to comply with changing environmental regulations.

Current controls include scrubbers for sulfur dioxide (SO₂), low-nitrogen oxide (NO_X) burners and overfire air for NO_x, activated carbon injection for mercury control and electrostatic precipitators (ESPs) for particulate control. In addition, Laramie River is operated in an environmentally sound manner to maximize efficiency using advanced software technology.

Missouri Basin Power Project, the owners of Laramie River, continues to explore new and innovative ways to provide low-cost reliable power in an environmentally responsible manner.

Water supply

Water used at Laramie River is pumped from the Grayrocks Reservoir and from groundwater wells through pipelines to a raw water storage pond on the plant site. It's then pumped to the water treatment plant, which conditions 25 million gallons of water daily.

Laramie River is a "zero-discharge" facility. None of the water used in the plant is returned to its source. A plant water balance system is based on a philosophy of maximum reuse. This is accomplished by assigning water to uses requiring successively lower qualities.

Brief Summary of Project

Lincoln-Pipestone Rural Water System (LPRW) proposes to construct new groundwater wells, water treatment plant, transmission and distribution pipeline, and a pump station. LPRW proposes to initially provide potable water to the cities of interest and/or need, and rural customers for agricultural production and/or household consumption. Other small communities are likely to be served in the future. The proposed project also includes metering facilities for new users.

Detailed Description of the Project

Lincoln-Pipestone Rural Water System (LPRW) serves approximately 4,600 rural customers and 36 bulk municipal customers in 10 counties in southwest Minnesota. Originally constructed in the mid-1970's, the LPRW system has expanded over 40+ years as demand for reliable, affordable, potable water has grown. LPRW receives water service requests and adds several dozen rural customers throughout the system every year. Periodically, LPRW completes larger construction projects, adding up to several hundred users at a time, expanding or replacing existing facilities, or completing other hydraulic improvements to the system.

Over the last ten years, LPRW has received requests to provide water service to towns and rural customers in Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties. LPRW serves existing customers in portions of all three counties but requires a new water source and significant distribution system expansion and improvements to meet demands for new water service. The proposed project includes construction of groundwater wells, a water treatment plant (WTP), transmission and distribution pipeline, and a booster pump station. The project also includes metering facilities for new customers.

LPRW has located a reliable water source aquifer between the Cities of Dawson and Boyd. One production well has been installed so far. A 7-day pump test indicated that the well can sustainably produce 750 gpm. Three production wells minimum must be installed approximately 1 mile apart from each other and ideally no farther than 3 miles from the WTP. Raw water pipeline must be installed to deliver water from the wells to the WTP.

The water chemistry of the proposed water source was sampled and tested during aquifer pump testing. The natural groundwater contains high hardness and high concentrations of iron and manganese. LPRW proposes to construct a lime softening WTP to produce potable water meeting EPA primary and secondary MCL regulations. The WTP will be designed to treat and pump 1,500 gpm (2 MGD).

New water transmission and distribution pipelines are needed to deliver water from the WTP to end users. LPRW has some existing pipe in the area which can be used, but the increased demands from new users require that additional pipeline be built. Additionally, some of the new customers lie outside of LPRW's existing service area, so pipeline will need to be built into areas currently unserved by LPRW. Pump stations are often necessary in distribution systems to overcome ground elevation changes and energy loss due to friction of water movement in a pipeline. Meter pits for individual rural users and bulk meter stations for municipal connections will also be installed as part of the project. The project will not include municipal infrastructure improvements downstream of the metered connection.

Rationale for Project Need

LPRW currently serves the north part of their system from the Burr water source. The Burr WTP lies about 8 miles west of the City of Canby. LPRW has limited capacity to serve new water demands from the Burr water source because LPRW nearly reaches their water withdrawal permit amount from the Burr well field each year. LPRW purchases water from the neighboring Brookings-Deuel Rural Water System so as not to exceed the withdrawal permit. Furthermore, the existing transmission pipeline conveying water from the Burr WTP to existing LPRW water users in Lincoln, Lyon, Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties is very nearly at capacity and would require significant improvements even if the water was available at the Burr water source to deliver to the area of new growth. A new water source and new water pipeline are needed to serve demand.

Lack of good-quality water limits agricultural development. LPRW receives water service requests from farmers who wish to build new livestock confinement units in Lincoln, Lyon, Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties. Existing LPRW customers occasionally request permission for a larger water allocation to expand livestock facilities already served by rural water. LPRW has denied both types of requests by necessity because of limited water source capacity at the Burr water source and limited transmission capacity from the Burr WTP. Farmers are forced to drill their own wells which is expensive or suspend plans for development. More livestock confinement units would be built or expanded if high quality water was readily available from LPRW.

Groundwater in Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties generally has high hardness and high concentrations of sulfate, iron, and manganese similar to the water found by LPRW during new water source exploration. Hardness and the minerals listed are not toxic, but they can cause water to taste bad, can cause water discoloration, and can stain or clog water use fixtures. Water hardness can be removed by individual water users using a typical home ion exchange softening system. Home softening systems produce a salty wastewater stream which is discharged to the sanitary sewer in a municipal setting and the septic system in a rural setting. Rural septic systems are unregulated, but the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) has increased regulation of municipal salty wastewater discharge. Salty discharge from nearly every home in a town results in a significant amount of salty water entering the municipal wastewater treatment facility. The City of Dawson, for example, has high hardness in their water supply, so many homes and businesses have softening systems which discharge salty water to the city wastewater treatment plant. Initial capital costs and ongoing operation and maintenance costs are high for bulk municipal water hardness treatment or bulk municipal salty wastewater treatment. Small cities like Dawson have trouble financing new construction or upgrades to water

or wastewater treatment plants. LPRW proposes to build a lime softening WTP and sell water to multiple cities including Dawson to reduce water hardness and salty wastewater discharge problems. The LPRW lime softening WTP will also remove iron and manganese.

Some city water sources are contaminated with minerals that are toxic for human consumption. The City of Hanley Falls' water source, for example, contains arsenic exceeding the EPA primary MCL. The City has an arsenic removal water treatment plant, but the city water bills are nearly three times the statewide average because of expensive capital costs to build the water treatment plant and expensive operations and maintenance. The water source to be used by LPRW has small amounts of arsenic far below the EPA MCL.

Water treatment plants are expensive to build, operate, and maintain especially for small cities with a limited population to support a large building project. A new LPRW water source and WTP can provide reliable, affordable, safe water service to multiple cities and rural residents and boost agricultural development.

Timeline for Project

The following project timeline assumes that funding for the project will be available in 2020.

Design: Aug 2020 – Nov 2021 Construction: Mar 2022 – May 2024

Other Relevant Background Information

LPRW has long sought a new water source in the north part of their system to offset demands on the Burr water source. A new water source will allow them to provide more water to existing customers who wish to expand livestock operations and serve new customers in Lincoln, Lyon, Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties. In 2008-2011, LPRW performed extensive water source exploration to secure a new water source near Wood Lake. A favorable aquifer was discovered, but based on DNR recommendations stemming from potential utilization of the aquifer from competing high-capacity users, LPRW was forced to withdraw from developing this resource.

LPRW began exploration for a new water source near the City of Dawson in 2017. A favorable location for a well field has been found between the Cities of Dawson and Boyd. LPRW has worked closely with the DNR during exploration; the DNR has preliminarily indicated that there are no sensitive natural resources which may be damaged as a result of water source development. Based on water quantity and water quality information collected during a 7-day pump test of a well installed in the aquifer, LPRW proposes to install two to three production wells and a lime-softening water treatment plant generally between the Cities of Dawson and Boyd.

Project Funding Sources

LPRW seeks direct appropriations from the State of Minnesota to develop a new water source and distribute potable water to cities and rural residences and businesses in Redwood, Yellow Medicine, and Lac Qui Parle Counties. USDA Rural Development has historically funded large capital improvement projects for LPRW. LPRW will apply for a loan from USDA Rural Development

to supplement direct appropriations as needed. LPRW will also collect connection fees from rural and municipal customers receiving water service as part of the project. The proposed project is multi-faceted, but the project components are dependent upon each other.
